Though death certificates and obituaries in Chicago establish their births and deaths, much of the family history of James and Elizabeth Griffith is based on property records from 1823-1839 (possibly as late as 1845) in Knox and Muskingum Counties, Ohio.^[E1] This is supplemented by census records from 1850 to 1880 in Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Illinois.

James Griffith's birthplace is still under investigation. (See Part I-D). It appears that his parents came from Maryland and spent the days of the Revolution in Maryland and migrated to Pennsylvania in 1790's. They possibly went from Maryland to the panhandle of Virginia in what is now Brooke or Ohio County, West Virginia. Deeds show that James' alleged father, Joseph, resided in Belmont County, Ohio by 1810. Deeds as well as marriage records for James' alleged brothers establish the family's residence in Belmont County from about 1808 to 1824. Subsequent migration to Knox County is established by deeds referring to residence in Belmont County while acquiring land in the Bladensburg area of Knox County. The move to Bladensburg took place about 1823-4. The family appears to have stayed in Knox County until about 1829 when they moved to Muskingum, County around Hopewell and Mt. Sterling villages.

Elizabeth Hall's birthplace is still under investigation. It is shown as Ohio in the census records of 1850-1870 but as Pennsylvania in the 1880 census as well as on her death certificate (which was probably filled out by her daughter, Rachel). Published accounts of her family state that the Halls migrated from Baltimore to Bedford County Pennsylvania before the Revolution and came to Ohio in 1814. It is reported (but not confirmed) that they first lived in Pickaway County, Ohio. They later settled in Bladensburg, Knox County where her parents died and are buried.

It is possible that both the Griffiths and Halls had lived in the same region of Bedford/Huntingdon Counties in Pennsylvania--but at least one death record suggests the Griffiths stayed in Maryland until after the Revolution and then migrated to the border region of Ohio and Virginia. (See Part I-D)

A somewhat ambiguous record establishes the marriage of James Griffith to "Mary" [sic] Hall in Knox County in 1825. A subsequent deed identifies Elizabeth as "Elizabeth M. Griffith," James' wife, suggesting that her middle name might be "Mary." It was common in the 1800s for women to use their middle names. Their Bladensburgh marriage is supported by statements of her sister Rachel as quoted in the published Harlan Genealogy. There is adequate evidence to validate the marriage.

James and Elizabeth first farmed near Martinsburg in Knox County and then may have moved into Hopewell Township, Muskingum County, Ohio. The last public record for James and Elizabeth in Knox County was their November 1829 quitclaim of the family farm, T5 R11, to James' brother-in-law, Obadiah Hall.

A James and Elizabeth Griffith sold a lot in Mt. Sterling in 1839. The 1830 U.S. Census for Muskingum County lists James' brother, Isaac. The 1840 Census lists his brothers Benjamin and Mahlon in Hopewell Township, Muskingum County, and the 1850 lists his brother Benjamin also in Hopewell Township. Their daughter Ruth, James' parents, Joseph, and Catherine, and his brother, Mahlon, are all buried at Hopewell Village Cemetery (formerly Hopewell Union Church Cemetery. The church no longer stands.

Unfortunately James and Elizabeth were not found in the 1830 or 1840 census. Complicating the problem is the possibility that there was another couple referred to as James and Elizabeth Griffith who apparently belonged to the Griffith family of Jefferson County, Ohio. They had property transactions recorded in

Muskingum County. The last recorded deed for " James and wife Elizabeth M. of Muskingum County" was a dated 1839.³

The first record of James and family in Iowa is the 1850 U.S. Census for Johnson County. It implies the birth of their youngest son, Cyrus, took place about 1845 in Iowa. Not only James, but his wife and daughters as well, had claims to patents in Solon, Iowa. They do not appear to have stayed long in Solon. James' daughter, Catherine, may have met Orson West in Solon. However it is possible the Wests and Griffiths migrated to Solon together in the late 1830's. Neither family has yet been found in the 1830 census. No marriage record has been found.

The 1850's Iowa State census records do not show James Griffith living in Solon. James' daughter, Rachel, married Pleasant Morris Harlan in 1859 in Quincy IL. The Harlan family history claims that Rachel lived in Quincy, Illinois at the time. An 1855-1856 directory for Quincy lists J. Griffith "horse ferrier," seems to confirm this. No public record of the marriage has been found.⁴

By the 1860 census James Griffith, William H. Griffith, and Catherine's husband, Orson West, have accumulated some wealth. They may have disposed of some real estate--or just perhaps-- they may have gone to the California gold rush. No California records have been found to substantiate this although some ships' passenger records may support it. (See Part I- D, Research) It is also possible that Elizabeth inherited wealth from her parents who died in 1852 although no will or probate has been found for either parent in Knox County, Ohio where they are buried.

By 1865 James and Elizabeth are living with their son, Cyrus, in Leavenworth Kansas but by 1870 the three of them had moved to Hannibal, Missouri, across the Mississippi River from Quincy, IL. The census records and his obituary indicate that James was a veterinarian--or "horse ferrier." They seemed to be constantly on the move.

Their son, William H. Griffith, married Alice Combs of New York, probably in Iowa about 1869. By 1870 they were in St. Louis with a newborn son, Charles, named for Alice's father. Charles died young. By 1880 William and Alice were in Plattsburg, Clinton Co., MO with their seven-year-old son, William H. called "Willie."

By 1880 James and Elizabeth had moved to Chicago. Their daughter, Rachel Harlan and her children lived with them. James died there in 1884 and is buried at Oakwood Cemetery..

Son, William H. Griffith (Sr.) became ill in 1889 and was sent to a hospital in Chicago where he died. His body was returned to St. Joseph, MO where his widow, Alice, and son lived.

That same year Cyrus, the youngest son of James and Elizabeth died from Epilepsy in Chicago. He is buried in Oakwood Cemetery as are James and Elizabeth.

Rachel Griffith Harlan returned to Kansas City where her husband Pleasant Morris Harlan died in 1893. Rachel died in 1904. They are buried with their children in Union Cemetery, Kansas City.

Elizabeth died in 1891 and is also buried at Oakwood Cemetery.

Details of daughter, Elizabeth and son, James are under investigation.

The early life of Joseph Griffith is somewhat speculative. It is based on my report entitled “Joseph Griffith Genealogy, 2011.” Considerable evidence in Baltimore County deeds and Quaker records makes the following genealogy very plausible:

Joseph was born a Quaker in Richland, Bucks Co. PA to Isaac and Ann Burson Griffith.^{F5} The genealogy is based on Quaker records.^[F7] His parents migrated to northern Baltimore County, Maryland about 1769 and joined the Gunpowder Meeting, Society of Friends. Although some of Joseph’s siblings remained Quakers, Joseph apparently did not.

Joseph’s mother, Ann Burson Griffith died about 1773 Shortly thereafter his father, Isaac, removed to Fairfax County, Virginia west of present day Washington, DC apparently to marry his wife’s sister-in-law. The Friends Meeting at Fairfax turned down his request to marry. So he married the woman in Frederick County, Maryland and was disowned for that act. Isaac remained in the area around Fairfax and Loudoun Counties, Virginia.

Meanwhile Joseph had his own troubles with the Fairfax Meeting which complained of his “taking the Test” in 1779. He appears to have been forgiven when he acknowledge his transgression. The meaning of the term has not been discovered. In 1784 Joseph married Catherine Burson who apparently was not a Quaker about 1786 and returned to Gunpowder Falls in Maryland. **On July 9, 1786 the Gunpowder Meeting condemned “Joseph Griffith and Catharine (before marriage Burson) for marrying outside the good order.”**

No subsequent reference to Joseph has been found in the Quaker records of Maryland, Virginia, Pennsylvania or Ohio. It is assumed he left the faith as did several of his siblings.

Catherine’s parents are not known—but it is possible she was the daughter of Isaac Griffith’s second wife.

In 1785 Joseph appears to have bought his first property—a lot in the town of Baltimore—along with his older brother, Abraham—to satisfy lien on the property of Abraham’s mother-in-law, Anne Moore. Joseph subsequently sold his interest to Abraham. In 1796 Joseph and Catherine bought land named “Blathanackambury” at the Great Falls of the Gunpowder River. They sold it in 1799—and then possibly migrated west to Western Pennsylvania with other family members.^[10 a,b,c] Eventually these Griffiths migrated west to Ohio some settling in Belmont County and others in Muskingum County, OH.^[F9,10]

¹⁰ Noting the nine year difference between the birth of Rezin (b. 1819) and that of John (b. 1828), it is suggested that Rezin was the son of Eliza and that the other children were the children of Nancy. It is just a theory. There is no proof.

Joseph and Catherine first purchased property in Belmont County, Ohio shortly after the government began to sell land to settlers. He bought land southeast of St. Clairesville. Joseph is listed as an 'entryman' in Belmont County in 1810. A Thomas Griffith who may be Joseph's nephew was also an entryman.¹¹

The marriages of three of Joseph's presumed sons--Mahlon, Benjamin and Isaac--were recorded in Belmont County.^[6] The U.S. Census for Belmont County, Richland Township, 1820, lists a Joseph Griffith (possibly Joseph Jr.) and Mahlon Griffith.

Land records in Baltimore, Co. MD, as well as Belmont, Knox and Muskingum Cos., OH give supporting evidence that Joseph Griffith was married to Catherine. The 1799 deed in Baltimore shows the grantor as Joseph Griffith, but Catherine appears as wife of Joseph in the official recording of the document. A deed dated 1823 for Knox County land refers to them as "Joseph Griffith Sr and Catherine his wife of Belmont County." An 1829 Knox County deed from "Joseph Griffith, Sr. and Catherine his wife to James Griffith, states they were (by then) all of Knox County, Ohio, and that Joseph was selling "the farm on which Joseph lives--in 1829."^[D1] Catherine died in 1837 and is buried at the Hopewell Village cemetery.

The 1840 census in Muskingum county shows households both for Joseph's sons Benjamin and Mahlon, that of Benjamin containing an aged man that could be Joseph.

The evidence that Joseph was the father of any of the Griffith men (Benjamin, Mahlon, Isaac, James and Joseph, Jr.) is also built on land records in Ohio in the 1830's and 1840's--specifically in Knox and Muskingum Counties. (See Part I-D.) Unfortunately, nowhere do the deeds refer to "father," "mother," "son" or "brother."

The land in Belmont County was near St. Clairesville. Most of the Knox County deeds pertain to one principal location in Jackson Township, near Bladensburg or Martinsburg at Quarter 1, Township 5, Ranges 10 and 11.

Joseph and Catherine sold one 80-acre lot each, to James and Benjamin in 1823. They sold a part of a lot to James again in 1829.

Benjamin and his wife Jane sold similar lots to Joseph in 1829--but Catherine was not named in that deed.

Mahlon and his wife Mary sold land in the same vicinity to Joseph Jr. in 1830 and in 1831 they sold adjacent lots to Joseph Sr and to James.

James and his wife Elizabeth sold their farm, (originally owned by Joseph, Sr.) to Isaac in 1831.

Isaac and his wife Ann Eliza sold his U.S. patent near Bladensburg to Mahlon in 1836.

After 1830 they acquired land in Muskingum County. Joseph and Mahlon settled in Hopewell Township, Joseph and Mahlon buying lots in the Village of Hopewell and Isaac buying land in Washington Township.

Joseph died in 1845. Although the gravestones are worn and photographs are partly illegible, the best evidence suggests that Joseph and Catherine are buried side-by side in the family plot at Hopewell Cemetery. Son, Mahlon who died in 1848 is also buried there. No burial has been found for Joseph's sons Isaac and Benjamin. They may be buried at Hopewell--there are several unmarked graves in the row of Griffith graves. Joseph's son, Joseph Jr. is buried at Washington Town Cemetery in Guernsey County and his son James is buried in Chicago.

About 1836 Joseph Jr. bought property in Guernsey County, Ohio. He was first married to a woman named Eliza and second to a woman named Nancy. He moved to Guernsey County between 1836 and 1837 with wife, Nancy, according to Guernsey County deeds. They owned considerable property and opened a tavern on the National Road west of the town of Washington. They raised a large family and are buried with several children and grandchildren at the Washington Town Cemetery.

¹¹ Thomas is listed as an entryman in the western part of Belmont County in 1811 and acquired a patent to Guernsey land in 1824.^[D3] In the 1820 census for Belmont County he is shown as over 45 meaning he was born before 1775

Isaac and wife, Ann Eliza, Griffith lived for awhile at Martinsburg in Knox County where their son Lambert died. He is buried there. Isaac and Ann Eliza then bought land in Washington Township, Muskingum County but they lost the property and it was sold at auction by the Sheriff in 1845. Ann Eliza is buried with her son, Lambert, in the cemetery at Martinsburgh, Knox County. Isaac's son, Isaac, married Melinda Curtis and settled at Belmont, Goshen Township in Belmont County where Isaac (the son) died and was buried in 1895.

Benjamin and wife, Jane Engel Griffith lived out their lives in Hopewell, living with their son Mahlon and his wife Isabel Shue. Their son Benjamin and wife Elizabeth Holmes lived near by. The last record for Benjamin is the 1850 census for Hopewell Township in Muskingum County.

Mahlon and his wife Mary Richeson/Richardson Griffith also lived out their lives in Hopewell where Mahlon died at age 51/54 in 1848. He is buried in the Hopewell Cemetery. An inscription, "Mary," on a nearby gravestone implies his wife may be buried there also. His son Mahlon married Elmira Matthews in 1850 and they went west to Iowa.

The migration of James and Elizabeth Griffith to Iowa, Missouri and Illinois is documented in Section 2.2 of this family history.¹²

¹² Notes on other Griffiths in census: A Joseph Griffith, aged 26-45, appears in the 1820 census for Guernsey County. (Neither our subject Joseph Griffith Sr. nor his son Joseph Jr fit this person. It is known that Joseph Griffith, Jr. later lived in Guernsey County.) It seems likely that all these Griffiths in Belmont and Guernsey Counties belong to one larger family group--although perhaps only distantly related. Other Griffiths are found throughout the area from Washington County, Pennsylvania to Jefferson County, Ohio. (See Isaac Griffith, next section.) Joseph does not appear as a head of household in 1820--in fact he does not fit into any of the households in Belmont or Guernsey County. Nevertheless, deeds recorded in Belmont County refer to Joseph of Belmont County and Catherine his wife.(See Part I-D). So despite the census, Joseph did live in Belmont County.

Most of the above is based on the “Griffith Family” in *Early Friends Families of Upper Bucks* by Clarence V. Roberts and Quaker records as shown under “Sources” following. The history of this family will not be repeated here.

Isaac Griffith removed from Bucks County, Pennsylvania and brought his wife and family to Gunpowder Falls, Baltimore County, Maryland in 1769. This fact is noted in the Minutes of Gunpowder Friends Meeting. Ann died sometime after the marriage of her son Abraham to Mary Moore in April 1771 and before the marriage of her daughter Ann to Aquilla Price in February 1772. Shortly thereafter Isaac removed to Loudon County, Virginia and proposed to marry Ann’s sister-in-law, the widow of Ann’s brother, Benjamin Burson. Unfortunately the woman’s

name was Ann—born Ann Dickey Roberts—but now Mrs. Ann Burson. This created a problem for the Friends and future genealogists. The Fairfax Meeting rejected Isaac’s proposed marriage because the relationship was too close. Isaac went forward with his planned marriage which took place 27 November 1773 in Frederick County, Maryland. The Friends therefore disowned him. The problem for future genealogists is obvious—both his first and second wife were called “Ann Burson.”

During the Revolution Isaac and his second wife lived in Loudoun County. As a Quaker he did not fight in the war but is listed among the patriots who furnished beef to the troops (325 pound at 4 pence per pound.)

PA to Gunpowder, MD:²⁵ Gunpowder Monthly Meeting 24 of 5th month [24 May] 1769 Isaac Griffith presented certificate from Richland Monthly Meeting for himself, wife Anne and children: Abraham, Hannah, Mary, Ann, Sarah, **Joseph**, Martha, Elizabeth, Isaac, John, James. (Eldest daughter, Rachel not listed because she was by then married.)

1771-1773 Death of Ann Burson Griffith

Her death occurs between the marriages of two of her children:

Marriage of Abraham Griffith, son of Isaac and Ann, 3rd day, 4th month [Apr 3] 1771.²⁶

Marriage of Ann Griffith, daughter of Isaac and (deceased), 27th day, 2nd month [Feb 27] 1772.²⁷

1773 Isaac Griffith remarries—to another Ann Burson

Gunpowder Monthly Meeting refers to Isaac’s second marriage on 24th day, 11th month [24 Nov] 1773 “married outside the good order.”²⁸ Isaac and Ann had proposed “their marriage intentions” to the Fairfax, VA Monthly Meeting which refused to approve it. They were disowned 28th day, 5th month [28 May] 1774.²⁹ Their marriage took place in Frederick County, MD.

1773-1775 The Griffiths remove to Loudoun Co. VA, (west of Baltimore)

Fairfax Monthly Meeting receives Isaac’s sons **Joseph**, James and John on certificate from Gunpowder Meeting 25 June 1774. (Hinshaw, op. cit., p. 498)

However Fairfax Meeting returns Isaac’s request to Gunpowder Meeting—which disowns him.

Isaac is referred to as “Isaac of the Colony of Virginia” when on 3 March 1774 his daughter, Ann, widow of Aquilla Price, m. Wm Matthews. (Peden, op. cit., p 57)

Isaac again requests a certificate 30 Dec 1775 for himself and daughter Martha from Gunpowder to Fairfax (Peden, op. cit., p 66.)

1781 Joseph Griffith returns from Virginia to Gunpowder Falls

1781 Joseph Griffith, son of Isaac, granted certificate from Fairfax to Gunpowder Monthly Meeting 24 Feb 1781. Note: in 1779 Joseph Griffith complained of “taking the test”--acknowledged and accepted He retains his membership in Fairfax Meeting. (Hinshaw, op. cit., p. 498)

1781-82 Isaac still in Virginia but later returns to Gunpowder

Isaac requests reinstatement to Fairfax Meeting and it is approved by the Quarterly Meeting. He is received on certificate from Gunpowder Meeting 22 Dec 1781. (Hinshaw, op. cit., p. 498)

Fairfax Meeting granted certificate to Gunpowder Meeting 23 Nov 1782 to James and John Griffith and they removed with their father. (Hinshaw, op. cit., p. 498)

1782 Catherine Burson (future wife of Joseph Griffith) goes to Gunpowder

Fairfax Meeting grants her certificate to Gunpowder Meeting 23 Sept 1782 1782 “She having removed into its limits.” (Hinshaw, op. cit., p. 478)

1786 Joseph Griffith and Catherine Burson marry in Gunpowder Falls

Joseph Griffith and Catharine (before marriage Burson) condemned for marrying “outside the good order” 29 July 1786. (Peden, op. cit., p. 82)

Isaac's eldest son, Abraham Griffith, acquired property when he bid at public auction to settle the tax liens of his mother-in-law, Anne Moore. The property consisted of lots in downtown Baltimore and acreage called Red Oak Ridge, Riddick Ridge and Pleasant Prospect. He married first, Mary Moore, daughter of Anne and Walter Moore 3 Apr 1771. She died 13 Sep 1784.³⁰ Abraham married second to Rachel Taylor 30 Dec 1788 and had four children with her—including aforementioned Thomas Taylor Griffith. (Peden, op. cit., pp. 10, 21)

Isaac's eldest daughter, Rachel Griffith, married before the family left Pennsylvania. Her husband, Joseph Shaw, got in trouble with the Friends in 1773 because of drunkenness. In 1779 a record of Gunpowder Meeting grants a certificate to Rachel and her children. Her husband Joseph was not mentioned. From the Burson genealogy it appears that Joseph removed to western Pennsylvania and died 10 March 1823. Rachel died 11 May 1834.

Hannah Griffith married Moses Dillon in 1772 and went west, first to Fayette County, joined the Redstone Monthly Meeting in western Pennsylvania³¹ and then went on to Muskingum County, Ohio near Zanesville. Moses had an iron works on the Licking River very near Hopewell Village She remained a Quaker and is said to be buried in the Quaker cemetery in Muskingum County, Ohio.

Mary Griffith is mentioned only on the 1769 certificate when the family came to Gunpowder.

Ann Griffith married 1 Aquilla Price (Peden, op. cit., p. 51) and married 2, William Matthews in "Virginia Colony 3 Sep 1774 at Gunpowder Meeting house, witnesses Moses Dillon, Abraham and Mary Griffith and other. She died 6 Jul 1792 at age 89 and is buried at Gunpowder Meeting House. Her 11 children are listed in Peden, op. cit, pp. 9 and 57.

Sarah Griffith is mentioned only once: "On 25th day of 11th month, 1772, Sarah Griffith **charged with keeping unseemly company with a married man of her neighborhood.**" (Peden, op. cit. p. 63)

Joseph Griffith (See previous section)

Martha Griffith is mentioned only once when Isaac requests a certificate 30 Dec 1775 for himself and daughter Martha from Gunpowder to Fairfax implying she was still single. (Peden, op. cit., p 66.)

Elizabeth Griffith is listed as a daughter of Isaac in the Gunpowder records but is not shown as a child of Isaac in the Roberts genealogy. The Quaker records show: "On -[?] day of 8th month, 1780, Elizabeth Griffith was **charged with 'having' lately married out from among us by a priest.**" (Peden, op. cit. p. 73)

Isaac Griffith, Jr is mentioned only on the 1769 certificate when the family came to Gunpowder.

John Griffith is mentioned in 1774 when granted a certificate to Fairfax Meeting in Virginia. On 30 Sep 1786 he was charged with "**uncleanness and leaving these parts in a clandestine manner to the injury and disadvantage of his master.**" It sounds as if John skipped town—perhaps to go west. (Peden, op. cit. p. 83)

James Griffith is mentioned in 1774 when granted a certificate to Fairfax Meeting in Virginia.

The migrations of the Halls can be hypothesized (but not proven) in terms of published genealogies of the Halls[G] and the Lanes.[F1, F2, F3] The history of the Lane family is fairly well-documented in references E3 (Military) and F2 (Baltimore County). The history of the Hall family is less well-defined. But it seems that the two families may have been associated with each other in Baltimore. They are believed to have lived in northwest Baltimore County which became Harford County in 1774. Barnes (F2) shows that the Lanes owned land called “Level Bottom.” Current maps show a place called “Level” in Harford County. On 4 Aug 1746 a William sold William Cross 50 acres at Level Bottom. Samuel Lane (who died in Bedford Co. PA in 1779) is also shown as an owner of Level Bottom and Cross’s Lot suggesting a close relationship between the Halls and Lanes. That William Hall married Mary Merryman, daughter of Charales Merryman, Jr. 17 Feb 1734. They had children, John (b. 1735) and Mary (b. 1737) . This John Hall might be the father of William Hall (b. 1762).

William Hall was born in Maryland about 1762 according to census data.^[C7] No birth or baptismal record has yet been found for a child named William of the appropriate age. They appear to have migrated with their respective parents from Baltimore to Pennsylvania during or just after the Revolution. It might be speculated that they hoped to gain land in return for military service—and perhaps the opportunities in Pennsylvania were greater than in Maryland. The Pennsylvania western frontier had opened for settlement when the Treaty of ____ was signed at the end of the Pontiac Rebellion. It appears from the records of Chester County that William Hall and his father-in-law Samuel Lane both served from Chester County. (See Section E in Sources.)

By 1788, after the Revolution, the militia rolls of Huntingdon County (PA) list William Hall as well as three Lanes: Samuel, Wilkerson and Richard Lane.^[E1] (See 2.2.2.2 Rev. Samuel Lane & Mary Corbin for discussion of Lane migration from Baltimore.)

William Hall’s land was in eastern Huntingdon County in Shirley Township. Another William Hall had land n Union Township. An estate record wherein “Ruth,” wife of William Hall renounces her claim to his estate in 1798. ‘Our’ William was married to Jane by 1798. So there was another William in Huntingdon County—perhaps related. Could it have been William’s father?

A map of the Huntingdon County townships follows.

William and Jane are said to have married in 1790 in Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania. Most of their children were born there according to published genealogies and census records. William Hall acquired warrants for land in both Bedford County (the parent of Huntingdon County) and Huntingdon County—presumably for service in the militia. Many other Halls received comparable land. Many of these may be William’s kin. Some of these were also on the rolls of Revolutionary service from Chester County.

The Halls went to Ohio about 1809, first to Pickaway County and then settled permanently in Knox County at Bladensburg in 1814.^[F1] Jane’s brother, Abraham Lane, and his wife, Mary Morris, also settled there. ^[F3]

Bladensburg, on the stage road from Mount Vernon to Coshocton was laid out in 1833 by John and Samuel Wheeler and Washington Houk.³⁴ The Wheelers were 'Disciples of Christ-- or Christian Church, Church of Christ, Campbellites, originally from Baltimore.³⁵

Bladensburg was founded by Samuel Davidson who was b. near Baltimore 4 Nov. 1878 and came to Jackson Township in 1830. He had fought at the Battle of Bladensburg in Maryland in 1812. Jackson Township was organized out of Morgan 4 Sep 1815. It was blessed with springs, hills, and good soil and a stream called Wakatomica . The land was rich in iron ore. Originally densely wooded with oak, sugar, chestnut, and it was had an abundance of deer, bear, snakes and Indian hunters. One farm showed evidence of ancient mound fortifications.

William Hall bought property in Township 5 Range 11. It appears that William came with brothers and/or nephews - and possibly his father. Among the Halls were the names, Thomas, Elijah and Solomon. The cemetery of Bladensburg where William and Jane and many of their children are buried is on land owned by William.^{[F1]³⁶}

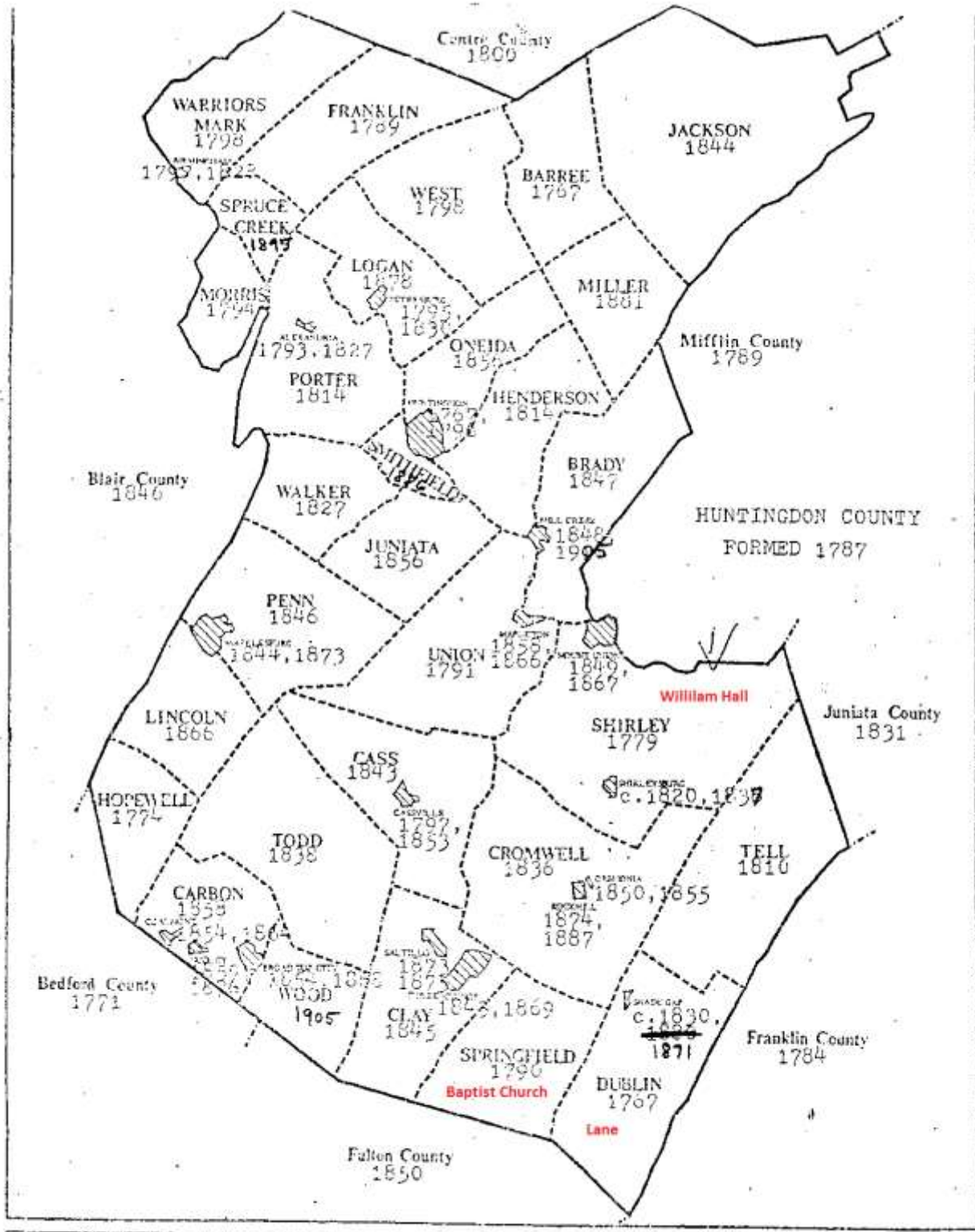

The family history of Rev. Samuel Lane is derived from published genealogies and extracted records of the Revolutionary and post-revolutionary war period. No independent research in primary records in Pennsylvania or Maryland was performed. (See "Sources": E2, Military, and F2, Baltimore County.)

The migration of the Lanes to Pennsylvania is partly supported in *Baltimore County Families*.^[F2: 391-395] It states that Samuel Lane Sr. (father of Rev/Maj. Samuel) died in Bedford County, Pennsylvania by 1779.

It appears that Rev./Maj. Samuel Lane fought in the Revolutionary War from Chester County, Pennsylvania, and after the war in the Bedford County. He would have been in his forties. Records indicate that he and his brothers, Wilkinson/Wilkerson and Samuel served.

Bedford County was created March 9, 1771. Huntingdon County was created from Bedford County on Sept 20, 1787. The Lanes settled in Brady Township on Aughwick Creek below Rockhill Furnace west of Tuscarora Mountain.^[F3] Later records show the Lanes in Huntingdon County, so it seems they must have settled in the northeastern part of Bedford County which became part of Huntingdon when it was created. They probably worked at Rockhill Furnace.

It seems that the Lanes migrated from their former lands at Level Bottom and Crosse's lot with the Halls of that same area of Baltimore County.

According to published sources, Samuel Lane's heritage goes back at least two generations in Maryland. His father was Dutton Lane. His grandfather was Samuel Lane supposed progenitor of the line. Samuel's father married in 1693 and died in 1726. Samuel was his third son. It is therefore likely that Samuel was born around 1700 and died at an advanced age.^[F2]

Samuel Lane was the father of Rev./Maj. Samuel Lane (Sec. 2.2.2.1) according to Barnes: *Baltimore County Families 1659-1759*.^[F2]

Barnes cites public records to show that Samuel Lane owned land in Level Bottom in Baltimore County purchased in 1756 from William Cross, as well as Lane's Bottoms and Lane's Hills.

"LANE, SAMUEL (7), son of Dutton (3) d. by 1779 in Bedford Co., Penna.; m. Jane (poss. Corbin); on 10 Jan 1756 William Cross conv. Samuel Lane 50 a. Level Bottom and Cross's Lot; Lane had Level Bottom and 120 a. vacant land resurv. As Lane's Bottoms and Hills, and on 27 Feb. 1757 he sold Capt. William Rogers 82 ac. of the latter tract; Samuel and Jane had iss.: SAMUEL, b. 8 Feb. 1736; LAMBERT; RICHARD; CHARITY, m. Greenbury Baxter; WILKINSON, b. 21 April 1743; SARAH, b. 8 Nov. 1746, may have m. Joseph Hays; CORBIN, DUTTON, ABRAHAM; and JOHN."⁴²

Some family researchers imply that the Lanes migrated to Carroll County before the Revolution, however since Carroll County was not created until 1837, they possibly resided in the part of Baltimore County that later became Carroll County.^[E]

It appears that Samuel migrated to Pennsylvania from Maryland at advanced age with some of his sons. They arrived in Bedford County before 1779 (by which time Samuel had died.)^[F2]⁴³ His sons Samuel, Richard and Wilkinson/Wilkerson served in the Continental Line from Bedford County in the Revolution^[D1] and in the militia after the war.^[D2]

The family settled in Brady Township on Aughwick Creek below Rockhill Furnace west of Tuscarora Mountain.^[F1] Later records show the Lanes resided in Huntingdon County--created from the northeastern part of Bedford County.

In 1704 Lane sold all the personal estate to Benjamin Hooker [possibly a relation to his wife?]. In 1708 he sold his share of "New Year's Purchase" to Richard Gist and Thomas Hooker. Again Hooker may be his in-law on his wife' side. These may also be related to the family of the famed Richard Gist, frontier explorer, speculator etc. etc. who emigrated to the Pennsylvania frontier just before the Revolution. Dutton's will gave his remaining property known as "Lane's Triangle " to his three sons and "Hampton Court" to his daughters.^[E2]
